## **Talking Business: with Wildfire Director, Roni Forrest**

**Wildfire is a Geraldton based consultancy directed by Roni Forrest and her husband Simon.**

Wildfire consults with the mining industry, government departments and universities to increase awareness of Western Australian Indigenous culture. Simon also runs cultural tours of Geraldton and Perth, with permission from local Elders, giving an Indigenous perspective on the history of conflict sites and other sites of significance.

Roni said, “Our backgrounds are in education and research. Simon has worked in the university sector as a lecturer in Aboriginal culture and education for over 25 years and I have worked with ECU for nearly 10 years.

Our real passion is Indigenous social and family history and we found we were getting a lot of requests for cultural awareness projects. So we decided to ‘get serious’ and start our business, Wildfire.”

Roni said the key to running a successful small business is to

have a plan and good discipline. “If you are working from home it’s important to separate your home life and work life. Good record-keeping and staying on top of the paperwork is crucial.

Have a direction for your business. Malcolm Smith at Small Business Corporation in Geraldton gave us good advice on developing our business idea and assisting us in establishing a business plan for Wildfire.”

She said that despite the hard work, running a small business has many rewards.

“It’s something we love to do. We’re working in areas we are passionate about and the diversity of our business allows us to work with many interesting people. We’ve had excellent feedback so far, and having a business such as ours, gives us lots of ways to expand in the future.”

## New Programs from Emu Services

**In October, Emu Services along with Workbase, Job Futures, the Gascoyne Training Group and TAFEWA commenced two new training programmes:**

- Fresh Start**  
 'Fresh Start' is an 8 to 10 week program aimed at Adult Education and 'C' class driver licensing/fine reduction. Fresh Start is considered the starting point for all future projects and has 38 participants so far.
- 'Mine-Site Ready'**  
 'Mine-Site Ready' is a 10 week programme developed through consultation with Mining Sector representatives, the Gascoyne Development Commission and the organisations mentioned above. The project has 15 participants who are training in subjects that will enhance their opportunity to secure employment in the mining industry. The programs are part of a three year plan to meet regional demands and opportunities for regional employment.

Emu Services aims to have all of their

participants graduate through the 'Fresh Start' program and then move onto ongoing training.

"We don't intend to hang our hat on mining sector opportunities alone; the Gascoyne has a great deal of employment and opportunity to offer. Other sectors such as horticulture and retail will be addressed as we continue." said Emu Services Manager, Greg Rose.

## Gindalbie and Mid West Business Mentoring

**Gindalbie Metals is about to embark on an initiative to provide business mentoring in the Mid West.**

The tailored mentoring program has been established in conjunction with the Geraldton Indigenous Coordination Centre (ICC) and the Mid West Chamber of Commerce and Industry (CCI).

The program aims to help existing business owners or start-up businesses develop strategies to assist them to compete for work in areas including the mining industry.

Under the program a mentor, supported by Gindalbie, is appointed to the business owner who acts as an adviser. The business advisors will offer advice based on their own practical knowledge, understanding and experience in business. Their role is not to direct the business, but to act as a guide and provide support through the start-up process.

The mentoring process will also offer networking opportunities with fellow business owners in the region, encouraging people to build new relationships and generate opportunities.
